## Message from our Pastor:

Hello all!!! I hope your Lent is progressing wonderfully.

For the pastoral message this week, I wanted to talk about the scripture account of Christ spending 40 days in the desert, all the while being tempted by the devil.

Christ was human and felt everything we would have felt had we spent 40 days in the desert. I could not imagine fasting for 4 days straight...one is long enough...but 40 days!!! That's a long time.

There are so many truths in that incident in Christ's life. Many different things God is teaching us.

One of them for sure has to do with from where we draw our strength.

The devil, in each of his temptations of Christ was using his (the devil's) same old tricks that usually trip us up. But to each of his usual temptations, Christ has a great response.

What are the usual tricks?

The first has to do with an OVER-RELIANCE on food or stuff. The devil tries to tempt Christ to turn stones into bread. Can you imagine how hungry Christ was after all that time? He was probably dreaming about his mom's cooking!

And yet Christ rejects the temptation. 'Man does not live on bread alone'

The devil tries to tempt with an OVER-RELIANCE on self as well. All Christ has to do is bow down to the devil and the devil promises him unlimited power on the earth. Again very tempting. With that authority, Christ could have satisfied any need he ever had. He could have provided money and security to all his loved ones and they would have no more worries through that power the devil was offering.

But Christ says no. 'Worship God alone'

The devil also tries to tempt with an OVER-RELIANCE on the angels. The devil tells Christ that if he were to throw himself off the mountain, the angels would save him. Christ responds, 'you shall not put God to the test.'

In each of these temptations the devil throws at Christ, there is an underlying temptation running through them all. It has to do with the temptation to rely on anything and everything other than God. Temptations to rely on food/stuff, ourselves, or even others.

We similarly are tempted to find our security (and thus, our happiness) in these three things as well. We are tempted to rely too much on stuff (you name it...food, cloths, cars, homes, etc), on ourselves (our talents, our title, our physical strength), and even on others (but remember the bible says 'rely on God alone' and 'trust God alone').

Especially in our current era, when we are so successful with medicine, with science and technology, we can idolize humanity and what humanity can do. We can even make idols out of our children or spouses/girlfriends/boyfriends. But an overreliance on these things has a false bottom.

A big part of Lent is remembering who we rely on to provide for us and how we can fulfill the deepest longings within us. That which cares for us and fills us is not stuff, it's not ourselves and it's not even others. It is only the Almighty.

I am amazed at how quickly I am reminded of my weakness whenever I attempt fasting. Fasting is very difficult and as such, is very humbling and helps us to see how much we rely on God's provision. It's one of the best outcomes of fasting...and is why it's recommended during Lent.

Christ shows us the way. It's not always the easiest way in the short term, but it's the true way. And it is better to be in the truth, even if it's harder than to fall for the devil's temporary illusion of satisfaction.

Faustina lived in Poland and Jesus appeared to her many times over a several year period. Sister Faustina died in 1938 and was canonized by Pope St John Paul II in 2000. Divine Mercy in My Soul, which is the diary of St Faustina, and 7 Secrets of Divine Mercy are two great resources to learn more about the life of this saint and devotion to Divine Mercy.
